Western Washington University is a dynamic, innovative, public university considered to be among the best in the Pacific Northwest. Western is recognized for excellence in undergraduate education, an increasingly diverse and multicultural learning environment, and a strong sense of community. Academic excellence, size, location, job placement of graduates, and affordable cost are primary reasons that students choose Western. Welcome!

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

Admission to Western Washington University is selective. Meeting minimum requirements does not guarantee admission, as the number of qualified applicants exceeds the number of available enrollment spaces.

Freshman (including all *Running Start* students) - Applicants must submit an official high school transcript or GED Certificate and SAT or ACT scores.

The minimum required high school course pattern includes:

- **English:** Four units of college prep composition and/or literature
- **Mathematics:** Three units, including geometry and two years of algebra beyond pre-algebra
- **Science:** Two units, with one year of algebra-based chemistry, physics, applied physics or principles of technology; one year must include a lab
- **Social Science:** Three units of history, civics, psychology, economics, etc.
- **World Language:** Two sequential units in a single foreign language, Native American language, or American Sign Language. The requirement may be satisfied for students from non-English speaking countries who entered the U.S. educational system in eighth grade or later.
- **Fine and Performing Arts:** One semester or trimester
- **Academic Electives:** One additional semester or trimester in any of the above areas

All students are encouraged to pursue academic course work and advanced study beyond the minimum course requirements listed above.

Cumulative academic achievement – including level and difficulty of courses and grade trends – is the most significant factor in application review. School and community involvement, special talents, multicultural experiences, strength of character, and personal circumstances are additionally considered.

Transfer - Western welcomes transfer students in all majors and from all types of colleges and universities. Primary considerations in the transfer review include cumulative grade point average, completion of major prerequisites and related experiences, clearly defined academic goals, breadth of curriculum, and multicultural experiences. Transfer applicants with fewer than 45 transferable credits at the time of application must meet Western's minimum high school requirements, and submit a final high school transcript and SAT or ACT test scores.

Postbaccalaureate - Preparation for major, cumulative academic record, related experience, and clarity of academic and career goals are the most important factors considered in the application review. All postbac applicants must include an academic plan for Western with their application for admission. Students planning to pursue teacher certification must apply simultaneously to Woodring College of Education.

Application INSTRUCTIONS

Segments of the application which may cause confusion or require further explanation are clarified below. We recommend you keep a file of all correspondence with Western, including a copy of the completed application form and transcripts of all high school and college course work.

Application Status (Section 2)

Freshman/Running Start: Student who has not attempted college credit after graduating from high school

Transfer: Student who has attempted college credit after graduating from high school

Postbaccalaureate: Student who has already earned a bachelor's degree

Residency (Section 3)

To qualify as a Washington State resident, you must be a U.S. citizen or have permanent resident (resident alien) status. You must also be a dependent student whose parent or guardian has been a legal resident for at least 12 months prior to enrollment, or an independent student who has established a permanent home in the state of Washington for at least 12 months prior to enrollment. Verification may be requested. The spouse or dependent of a person who is on active military duty can be allowed to pay resident tuition by providing appropriate documentation to the Registrar's Office.

A student cannot qualify as a Washington resident if s/he (or parent, in case of a dependent) has attended, as a resident, college in another state within a year prior to enrollment; has received financial assistance from another state, including a reciprocity award, within a year prior to enrollment; or possesses a current out-of-state driver's license, vehicle registration, or other document which gives evidence of being domiciled in another state.

If you are not a U.S. citizen and you have continuously resided in Washington State for three (3) years prior to receiving a high school diploma from a Washington high school, you may be eligible to pay resident tuition, in accordance with HB 1079 (see www.wvu.edu/depts/registrar/residency.shtml).

Financial Aid (Section 3)

Applying for financial aid does not affect your application for admission. For priority consideration, financial aid applicants must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) prior to **February 15, 2009**. The FAFSA is available at all high schools, colleges, and online. For more information, refer to www.finaid.wvu.edu or contact the Financial Aid Office at (360) 650-3470. Western's Title IV code is 003802.

Living on Campus (Section 3)

Detailed housing information is mailed to applicants at the time of admission. Priority for on-campus housing is based on the date the Office of Admissions receives a student's application for admission. While all students who choose to live on campus are able to do so, students who apply early are most likely to secure a room in one of their preferred residential areas.

Official Transcripts (Section 7,9)

To be official, transcripts must be sent directly from your high school or college to Western's Office of Admissions, delivered in an official and sealed envelope, or sent electronically. Applicants must submit transcripts from each college and university attended, regardless of whether transfer credit was earned or is desired. College credit from one institution which appears on a subsequent institution's transcript is unofficial and therefore not acceptable.

Scholarships (Section 14)

The Office of Admissions awards scholarships to exceptional new freshman and transfer students. Scholarship selection is generally determined by the information provided with the application for admission. Freshmen applying for Fall Quarter are encouraged to submit applications by the scholarship priority consideration date of January 31. Western's Honors Program is an exciting option for high-achieving freshman applicants who want an intimate college experience, but also want access to the resources of a larger institution. Admission to Honors is selective and based on a variety of factors, including strength of curriculum, outstanding achievement, standardized test scores, teacher/counselor recommendation, and a writing sample. While there are no minimum academic requirements for Honors, the vast majority of applicants have over a 3.8 GPA, strong academic writing skills, and a challenging course selection.

Multicultural Achievement Program (MAP)

Scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$2,000 are available to **freshmen and transfer** applicants who have demonstrated an ongoing commitment to multiculturalism and/or diversity. To be considered for a MAP scholarship, you must address in your application any past contributions to multiculturalism and/or diversity, and how you intend to promote these values at Western.

Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE)

Incoming freshmen from AK, AZ, CA, CO, HI, ID, MT, ND, NV, NM, OR, SD, UT, and WY who apply for Fall or Summer quarter are eligible for WUE scholarship consideration. Recipients of the WUE scholarship receive a reduced tuition level for four years at WWU. WUE scholarship selection is competitive, and priority is given to students with a 3.8 cumulative GPA, rigorous coursework, and 1200 SAT (critical reading + math scores) or 27 ACT.
